Community Wetland Restoration Project January 2024 – December 2024

1. Project Overview

- Title: Community Wetland Restoration Project
- Location: Barotse Floodplain, Senanga District, Zambia
- Duration: January December 2024
- Objective: Restore degraded wetland ecosystems through community-led replanting, patrols, and awareness campaigns to enhance biodiversity and sustain local livelihoods.

2. Background & Rationale

- The Barotse Floodplain wetlands are critical for biodiversity, fisheries, and community livelihoods.
- Overharvesting of reeds, illegal cutting, and climate pressures have degraded habitats.
- Community-driven restoration strengthens ecological resilience, aligns with Zambia's Wetlands Policy, and contributes to SDG 15 (Life on Land).

3. Activity Components

- Training youth and community members in wetland ecology and restoration methods.
- Establishment of wetland patrol teams to reduce illegal harvesting.
- Replanting of reeds and aquatic vegetation in degraded areas.
- Community awareness campaigns on wetland conservation.

Monitoring of biodiversity indicators (fish, bird nesting, reed cover).

4. Execution Phases

Phase 1 – Capacity Building (Jan – Mar 2024)

100 youth trained in wetland ecology, patrols, and restoration techniques.

Phase 2 – Restoration & Patrol Establishment (Apr – Aug 2024)

 20 ha of degraded wetland replanted with reeds and native plants; 4 patrol groups formed.

Phase 3 - Community Awareness (Sep - Oct 2024)

 8 community meetings and 2 radio programs conducted to promote sustainable reed use.

Phase 4 – Monitoring & Evaluation (Nov – Dec 2024)

 Drone mapping of restored sites; biodiversity indicators tracked (bird nesting sites and fish populations).

5. Implementation Timeline

- Jan Mar 2024: Training of youth & community groups
- Apr Aug 2024: Restoration activities & patrols
- Sep Oct 2024: Community awareness campaigns
- Nov Dec 2024: Monitoring, evaluation, reporting

6. Outcomes & Impact

Restoration: 20 ha of wetlands restored with native vegetation.
